
Commonwealth's Population Decreases for the Fourth Consecutive Year

MIDDLETOWN, Pa–Pennsylvania saw modest population growth from 1990 to 1995. In 1996, the state recognized a population decline for the first time in the decade. Earlier today, the U.S. Census Bureau released the 1999 state and county population estimate figures showing Pennsylvania's population decline trend has continued for a fourth consecutive year.


The Pennsylvania State Data Center at Penn State Harrisburg reports the Commonwealth's estimated population as of July 1, 1999, was 11,994,016. This was a 0.1 percent decrease from the 1998 figure of 12,002,329. Since the 1990 Census, the state's population has shown overall growth of just under 1 percent.

In 1990, Philadelphia was home to the greatest number of Pennsylvanians and this remained true in 1999. Philadelphia was followed by Allegheny County for greatest number of residents in 1999. Both counties had a estimated population in excess of 1.2 million.

Map 1: Estimated Population by County: 1999








At the county level, 43 of the state's 67 counties lost population from 1990 to 1999, while 39 did so from 1998 to 1999. From 1990 to 1999, Philadelphia lost the greatest percentage of population with 10.6 percent. Other counties losing the highest percentages of their population in the state in this time period were Allegheny (6 percent), Cameron (5.8 percent), Cambria (5.7 percent), and Lackawanna (5.7 percent). Both Cambria and Philadelphia counties experienced the greatest percentage decrease in the state from 1998 to 1999 at 1.2 percent. Other counties losing 0.9 percent of their population from 1998 to 1999 included Allegheny, Beaver, Lackawanna, and Schuylkill.

Pike and Monroe counties have seen the greatest percentage growth from 1990 to 1999 with 47.9 and 34.3 percent, respectively. The largest increases at the county level from 1998 to 1999 were in the eastern part of the state. Not surprisingly, Pike County had the largest growth from 1998 to 1999 at 3 percent followed by Monroe with 2.5 percent. Population gains were also seen in Chester (1.9), Wayne (1.4), Adams (1.2), Bucks (1.1), and Butler (1.0) counties from 1998 to 1999.

The 1998 Detailed State and County Estimates for Pennsylvania has just been released by the Pennsylvania State Data Center. The detailed estimates report includes total population by gender and by singleyear divisions up to age 19. After age 19, it provides total population for five year cohorts (20 to 24, 24 to 29,

etc.). In addition, the detailed report includes population estimates by white and black race groups for the state and selected counties. Tables include state and county level total population estimates along with the previous year's estimate and the 1990 Decennial Census' total population count.
