Home Ownership Grows, Household Types Change in Pennsylvania Through the Nineties

MIDDLETOWN, Pa The Pennsylvania State Data Center at Penn State Harrisburg reports that in 1990, 70.6 percent of all occupied housing units were owner-occupied. In 2000, owners occupied 71.3 percent of all occupied housing (see Table 1). This and other data was recently released from the U.S. Census Bureau s General Demographic Profile, which provides information including age, sex, race, Hispanic or Latino origin, household relationship and whether the residence is owned or rented. The profile is a prerelease of Summary File 1 (SF1) (100% data), which is scheduled to be released on or before the end of September 2001.

The total of all housing units increased 6.3 percent from 1990. Owner-occupied housing units increased 7.2 percent (3,176,121 to 3,406,337) from 1990 to 2000. When compared to the growth in Pennsylvania's population from 1990 to 2000, the owner-occupied increase is even more pronounced (see Table 2).





From 1990 to 2000, household types in Pennsylvania saw a decrease in the percent of family households and married-couple households, while the percent of non-family households increased. Family households decreased from 70.2 percent of total households in 1990 to 67.2 percent in 2000 even though the number of family households increased from 3,155,989 in 1990 to 3,208,388 in 2000. Married-couple households decreased from 55.7 percent of total households in 1990 to 51.7 percent in 2000. The number of married-couple households decreased as well, from 2,502,072 in 1990 to 2,467,673 in 2000. Nonfamily households increased from 29.8 percent of total households in 1990 to 32.8 percent in 2000. They also increased in number from 1,339,977 in 1990 to 1,568,615 (see Table 3).

The average household size decreased from 2.57 in 1990 to 2.48 in 2000, and average family size decreased from 3.10 in 1990 to 3.04 in 2000 (see Table 4).

Monroe County Leads the State in Housing Unit Growth in the Nineties

Monroe County led the state in percent change in number of housing units, experiencing a 23.3% increase. This increase represents a numeric increase of 12,758 housing units. Adams County (18.9%) and Butler County (18.3%) finished second and third in increase in housing units. Table 5 shows percent change in households in Pennsylvania by county from 1990 to 2000.
