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Voter Registration Increases 2.3 Percent in Pennsylvania in 2001

MIDDLETOWN, Pa – The Pennsylvania State Data Center at Penn State Harrisburg reports that Pennsylvania's voter registration increased 2.3 percent from April 2000 to April 2001. This information, from the Pennsylvania Department of State, reports that the commonwealth had 7,698,471 persons registered to vote in the April 2001 elections. This represents 82 percent of Pennsylvania's voting age population, according to Census 2000.

Of those registered to vote in the April 2001 election in Pennsylvania, 48.1 percent were registered Democrats and 41.7 percent were registered Republicans. Other political parties including the Constitutional, Libertarian and Green parties comprised the remaining 10.2 percent of registered voters. Republicans gained 46,895 registered voters from 2000 to 2001, a 1.5 percent increase. Democrats registered 67,420 new voters for an increase of 1.9 percent (see Table 1).

Allegheny County led all Pennsylvania counties with the highest percentage of voting age population registered to vote in April 2001 at 92 percent. Pike (91 %) and Bucks counties (90 %) were the only other counties in Pennsylvania that had over ninety percent of their voting age population registered to vote. Four counties had voter registration rates under 70 percent: Clinton (69 %), Indiana (67 %), Snyder (66 %) and Union (55 %).

The greatest increase from 2000 to 2001 of registered voters by percentage was Fulton County with an increase of 10.0 percent. Pike County joined Fulton County as counties with an eight percent or better increase in registered voters. Six counties saw a decrease in registered voters from 2000 to 2001: Delaware (-9.1 %), Venango (-2.9 %), Cambria (-2.7 %), Cumberland (-1.1 %), Somerset (-1.1 %) and Chester (-0.3 %).

Party registrations varied greatly between counties in 2000 and 2001 (see Table 2).
