Policing Persons with Mental Illness: The Pennsylvania Experience James Ruiz, Ph.D.

New Orleans Police Department, Ret. Assistant Professor of Criminal Justice School of Public Affairs Penn State Harrisburg

Dr. Ruiz will describe the existence or lack of policies for police officers responding to calls involving persons with mental illness. He will also give an overview of police departments who have guiding measures in place to provide assistance to departments wishing to update their policies. In addition, Dr. Ruiz will provide a measure of the frequency of calls involving persons with mental illness. He also will provide information regarding those calls that resulted in violent outcomes. Lastly, Dr. Ruiz will assess police officers' perception of dangerousness and violence regarding calls involving persons with mental illness.

James Ruiz is an Assistant Professor of Criminal Justice in the School of Public Affairs, Penn State Harrisburg. He received his Ph.D. in Criminal Justice at Sam Houston State University in December 2000. He served with the New Orleans Police Department from 1967 to 1985.



The State of the Commonwealth: 2000 report analyzes economic, social, population and housing trends in Pennsylvania based on the results of Census 2000. The report was written by Gretchen Cornwell, Ph.D., with the Population Research Institute at The Pennsylvania State University, and

A Profile of Prescription Drug Coverage and Other Health-Related Issues: Results of the Statewide Survey of Older Pennsylvanians - 2001 Barbara Sims, Ph.D.

Assistant Professor of Criminal Justice and Faculty Director of the Center for Survey Research Institute of State and Regional Affairs Penn State Harrisburg

In the fall of 2001, the PACE/PACENET Program within the Pennsylvania Department of Aging contracted with Penn State Harrisburg's Center for Survey Research to conduct a statewide survey of older Pennsylvanians. Through a statewide RDD (Random Digit Dialing) telephone survey, the study measured the extent and nature of prescription drug coverage for this particular population and explored differences within certain socio-economic and demographic groups related to coverage. The purpose of this presentation is to present the major findings from the PACE study, which yielded 1,195 completed interviews with Pennsylvania's population, age 65 and over.

Dr. Sims joined Penn State Harrisburg's School of Public Affairs in 1997 after completion of her Ph.D. in Criminal Justice at Sam Houston State University, Huntsville, Texas. She is an Assistant Professor of Criminal Justice and also serves as faculty advisor to the Penn State Harrisburg Criminal Justice Club. In her capacity as Faculty Director of the Center for Survey Research, Dr. Sims has worked on several public opinion surveys. Dr. Sims received Penn State Harrisburg's James A. Jordan Teaching Award in the Spring of 2002.
