County Population Estimates Released for 2002: Philadelphia, Allegheny, Montgomery and Bucks Among Nation's 100 Largest Counties

MIDDLETOWN, Pa – The Pennsylvania State Data Center at Penn State Harrisburg reports that Philadelphia (20th), Allegheny (29th), Montgomery (66th) and Bucks (98th) counties ranked in the list of the Nation's 100 Largest Counties in 2002. This data is based on the 2002 County Population Estimates that were released today by the U.S. Census Bureau. These estimates used April 1, 2000 (Census Day), as a base and were carried forward to July 1, 2002, based on birth, death and migration data. Western and southern states accounted for twelve of the top twenty spots on the list with California accounting for six spots on its own. Pike County (81st) had the highest population percentage increase in the state and was the commonwealth's lone entry on the list of the Nation's 100 Fastest Growing Counties in 2002.

Births, Deaths and Migrations in the Commonwealth

There were an estimated 323,841 births in Pennsylvania between April 1, 2000 and July 1, 2002. An estimated 289,083 deaths during this time period resulted in a birth-death surplus of 34,758 persons. There were 50,692 net international migrations into Pennsylvania and –26,701 net internal migrations out of the commonwealth, resulting in a gain of 23,991 persons.

Numeric Population Change

Chester County (16,659 pop increase) had the largest estimated gain in population between April 1, 2000 and July 1, 2002 (Table 1). Montgomery County (16,420 pop increase) and Bucks County (12,808 pop increase) represented the next largest estimated population increases during this time period. Philadelphia County (25,319 pop decrease) had the largest estimated population decrease.

Percent Population Change

Pike County's population increased an estimated 8.2 percent between April 1, 2000 and July 1, 2002. Monroe County (7.3 percent pop increase) and Chester County (3.8 percent pop increase) represented the next largest estimated population percentage increases in Pennsylvania during this time period. McKean County (2.3 percent pop decrease) had the largest estimated population decrease.


