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U.S. Census Bureau Releases County-to-County Migration Flows for Pennsylvania

MIDDLETOWN, Pa – The U.S. Census Bureau has released today, the County-to County Migration Flows for Pennsylvania. This data, collected from the long form questionnaire from Census 2000, documents migratory patterns from 1995 to 2000. This data shows that the number of people moving into Pennsylvania from 1995 to 2000 was 668,753 while the number of people moving out of the state was 800,049. In Pennsylvania, the 5-year net migration (in-migrants minus out-migrants) was –131,296. Pennsylvania lost 11.4 people per 1,000 residents from 1995 to 2000.

The most common trend among most county-to-county migration flows in Pennsylvania is that the most popular locations for movers are neighboring counties. The three most visible exceptions to this trend were Centre County, Erie County and Crawford County. The most popular counties of in-migration to Centre County, home of the Pennsylvania State University, were Allegheny (2,563 in-migrants), Bucks (1,517 in-migrants) and Montgomery (1,456 in-migrants) counties. Erie County, the commonwealth's most northwestern county, received more in-migrants from Allegheny County (2,173 in-migrants) than from any other county. Crawford County sent more out-migrants to Cumberland County (2,439 out-migrants) than to any other county.

Pennsylvania's largest county, Philadelphia, had the state's highest in-migration of people, 135,266, and the highest out-migration of people, -229,424, giving Philadelphia County a net migration of –94,158. Over 40 percent of Philadelphia's in-migration came from other counties within Pennsylvania. Delaware County, directly south of Philadelphia, had the most people moving into Philadelphia, 13,295. Another southeastern county, Montgomery, saw 12, 183 people migrate into Philadelphia between 1995 and 2000. The state that had the highest in-migration to Philadelphia was New Jersey. New Jersey had 18,968 people migrate into Philadelphia, with Camden County providing 4,366 of the total. California had 5,716 people migrate into Philadelphia, with Los Angeles County sending 2,194.

Looking at Philadelphia's out-migration, 108,497 of the 229,424 people that migrated out of Philadelphia stayed within Pennsylvania. Philadelphia out-migrated 34,136 people to Montgomery County, the most of any county in the state, followed by Delaware County, 23,495. New Jersey was the state of choice for people leaving Philadelphia between 1995 and 2000. The number of people that out-migrated to New Jersey from Philadelphia was 34,127, with 11,427 of those migrating to Camden County. The next most popular state for Philadelphians to move to was Florida with 12,039. Broward County being the most popular place, 1,475. New York (9,455), Virginia (6,993) and Maryland (6,646) finished third through fifth, respectively.



Cameron County had the lowest in-migration of people of any county in Pennsylvania from 1995 to 2000. There were only 636 people moving into the county with 425 migrating from other counties in Pennsylvania.

Cameron County also had the lowest out-migration of people of any county in Pennsylvania from 1995 to 2000. The county had 825 people migrate out of the county with 603 of them moving to other counties in Pennsylvania.

So what county did most Pennsylvanians move to between 1995 and 2000? New Castle County, Delaware was the most popular with an in-migration of 21,219 Pennsylvanians. The second most popular choice was Camden County, New Jersey with 16,519. Maricopa County, Arizona had an in-migration of over 11,000 Pennsylvanians while Los Angeles County, California had almost 8,800. Table 1 provides a list of out-of-state counties that Pennsylvanians out-migrated to from 1995 to 2000.

New Castle County, DE, with an out-migration of 14,227 was the county with most number of people moving into Pennsylvania (excluding Pennsylvania counties). Next was Kings County, New York with 13,346. Los Angeles County, California ranked number 11th with 8,248 out-migrants to Pennsylvania. Cook County, Illinois had 6,009, San Diego County, California had 5,497 and Broward County, Florida had 4,959. Table 2 provides the top twelve non-Pennsylvania counties with the highest migration into Pennsylvania from 1995 to 2000.

Additional reports released last week by the U.S. Census bureau document the geographic variation in migratory patterns among census regions, divisions and states. The most popular state-to-state origination point for Pennsylvania inmigrants was its northern neighbor New York, which had 112,214 persons move to Pennsylvania between 1995 and 2000. The commonwealth's eastern (New Jersey; 110,436 persons) and southern (Maryland; 53,036 persons) neighbors were the next two most popular origination points for inmigrants. Two warm-weather states, Florida (44,123 persons) and California (34,494 persons), rounded out the top five origination points for Pennsylvania inmigrants between 1995 and 2000. Florida was also the top location for persons moving out of Pennsylvania between 1995 and 2000, receiving 92,385 persons (Table 3). New Jersey (88,202 persons) and New York (67,213 persons) were the next most popular locations. This followed the same trends of the 1990 Census, which measured migration between the years of 1985 and 1990.

A look at the net migration statistics for Pennsylvania shows that over fifty percent of migrants were between the ages of 20 and 29. Between 1995 and 2000, there were only two age groupings that experienced a positive net migration. The 5 to 9 age group had a net gain of 49 people and the age 15 to 19 age group had a net gain of 2,754 people. The total net migration for ages 5 to 19 was a positive 1,275. In the 65 and over age group, Pennsylvania has a net migration loss of 15,884 people.
