County Population Estimates Released for 2003: Pike County Among Nation's 100 Fastest Growing Counties

MIDDLETOWN, Pa – The Pennsylvania State Data Center at Penn State Harrisburg reports that Chester County (87th) and Montgomery County (97th) ranked in the nation's 100 counties with the largest population gains from April 1, 2000 to July 1, 2003. This data is based on the 2003 County Population Estimates that were released today by the U.S. Census Bureau. These estimates used April 1, 2000 (Census Day), as a base and were carried forward to July 1, 2003, based on birth, death and migration data. Pike County (85th) had the highest population percentage increase in the state and was the commonwealth's lone entry on the list of the Nation's 100 Fastest Growing Counties in 2003. Pike County was ranked 81st on this list in 2002.

Pennsylvania's estimated population of 12,365,455 continues to rank the commonwealth 6th in the nation in total population. Approximately 4.3 percent of the nation's 291 million persons live in Pennsylvania. With the 0.7 percent increase in population, the commonwealth continues to be a slow growth state. Pennsylvania ranked 24th in the nation in numerical population increase and 46th nationally in percent increase in population. California (1,612,800 more persons) ranked 1st nationally in numeric population increase while Nevada (12.2 percent) ranked 1st in percent increase in population.

Births, Deaths and Migrations in the Commonwealth

There were an estimated 464,646 births in Pennsylvania between April 1, 2000 and July 1, 2003. An estimated 424,782 deaths during this time period resulted in a birth-death surplus of 39,864 persons. There were 68,935 net international migrations into Pennsylvania and -16,472 net internal migrations out of the commonwealth, resulting in a gain of 52,463 persons.



Numeric Population Change

Chester County (23,892 pop increase) had the largest estimated gain in population between April 1, 2000 and July 1, 2003 (Table 1). Montgomery County (21,760 pop increase), Monroe County (12,808 pop increase) and Bucks County (15,478 pop increase) represented the next largest estimated population increases during this time period. Philadelphia County (38,211 pop decrease) had the largest estimated population decrease. Chester, Montgomery and Bucks all border Philadelphia and are within Philly's metropolitan area. Monroe County sits on Pennsylvania's northeastern border, next to New Jersey and within commuting distance to New York.

Percent Population Change

Pike County, which borders New York and New Jersey, had its population increase an estimated 12.7 percent between April 1, 2000 and July 1, 2003. Monroe County (11.4 percent pop increase) and Adams County (5.7 percent pop increase) represented the next largest estimated population percentage increases in Pennsylvania during this time period. Adams County is on the southern border of Pennsylvania, just north of Maryland. Cameron County (2.3 percent pop decrease), one of the least populated counties in the Commonwealth, had the largest estimated population decrease.
