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New Census Bureau Estimates Show Philadelphia Remains Nation's 5th Largest City

MIDDLETOWN, Pa – New population estimates from the U.S. Census Bureau show that Philadelphia remains the nation's 5th largest city. This data, from today's release of subcounty population estimates by the U.S. Census Bureau, shows that Philadelphia, with a population of approximately 1.5 million, still ranks ahead of Phoenix, Arizona by approximately 91,000 persons in the list of the nation's ten largest cities. This difference has decreased significantly since Census 2000 when the gap was over 196,000 people. The rankings show a change from Census 2000 with Dallas moving up to 8th position over San Antonio (see Table 1).

The estimates are based on Census 2000 and were updated using administrative records. The sub-county estimates for Pennsylvania include minor civil divisions (MCDs) that, for Pennsylvania, are its cities, townships and boroughs. Please note that due to changes based on the count resolution program, updates from the Boundary and Annexation Survey and geographic programs revisions, an April 1, 2000 estimates base was used in the estimating process.

Pennsylvania's Top Ten Cities

Of Pennsylvania's ten largest cities, only Bethlehem showed an increase in population since 2000. Bethlehem's population of 72,570 was an increase of 1,241 since 2000 (see Table 2). Among Pennsylvania's 57 cities, only four, showed population increases between Census 2000 and July 2003. Bethlehem had the largest increase followed by Coatesville, Hermitage, and Parker. Of these four, Coatesville had the largest percent increase, 3.5 percent.

Hallam Borough, York County, is Pennsylvania's Fastest Growing Community

With an estimated population increase of 39.7 percent since April 1, 2000, Hallam Borough in York County is Pennsylvania's fastest growing municipality. Forks Township in Northampton County ranked second with an increase of 36.8 percent. Penn Township in Chester County ranked third with a percent increase of 34.1 percent, followed by Warren Township, Franklin County, with a 33.5 percent increase and East Nottingham Township, Chester County with a 33.2 percent increase. Table 3 shows the ten fastest growing municipalities in Pennsylvania.

Pennsylvania's Incorporated Places of 10,000 or More

As of July 1, 2003, Pennsylvania had 71 incorporated places with a population greater than 10,000 persons. Fourteen of those places experienced a population increase since the April 1, 2000 decennial census. State College Borough, with a population increase of 1,308 was the largest growing municipality with a population of over 10,000. Bethlehem City, with a population of 72,570 was the second largest growing municipality with an increase of 1,241. The cities of Philadelphia (-38,211) and Pittsburgh (-9,226) had the largest decreases in population since 2000. Completing the top five in population loss were Erie (-2,344), Scranton (-2,095) and Altoona (-1,543).

Overall in Pennsylvania, there were seven municipalities that had a population increase of over 2,000 persons. Lower Macungie Township in Lehigh County had the largest increase in population (3,642) between Census 2000 to July 2003. There were also seven municipalities that lost more than 1,000 persons; six of these were cities, Philadelphia having the greatest loss (-38,211).
