Census Bureau Releases July 1, 2004 Population Estimates, Pennsylvania School-Age Population Declines

MIDDLETOWN, Pa –The Pennsylvania State Data Center at Penn State Harrisburg reports that the number of school-age children (ages 5 to 17) has declined in Pennsylvania. This data is from the July 1, 2004 state population estimates released today by the Census Bureau. The number of school-age children ages 5 to 17 has declined by 16,722 from 2003 to 2004, a decrease of 0.8 percent. From April 1, 2000 (Census Day) to July 1, 2004, the number in this age group declined by 76,533, or 3.5 percent. From July 1, 2003 to July 1, 2004 the number of children under age 5 has increased by 7,005, a 1.0 percent increase. However, the population of children under age 5 decreased by 8,679, or 1.2 percent from April 1, 2000 to July 1, 2004.

A look at the total population for Pennsylvania shows that the population increased by 35,531 from 2003 to 2004, a 0.3 percent increase and by 125,238 from 2000 to 2004, a 1.0 percent increase. The population age 18 and over increased by 45,248 from 2003 to 2004, a 0.5 percent increase and by 210,450 from 2000 to 2004, a 2.2 percent increase. The population age 65 and over decreased from 2003 to 2004 by 3,988 persons, a 0.2 percent decrease. This age group also declined from 2000 to 2004 by 22,662, or 1.2 percent. The number of people age 85 and over increased by 12,467 from 2003 to 2004, a 4.5 percent increase. From 2000 to 2004, the number of people age 85 and over increased by 53,319, or 22.4 percent. Pennsylvania's estimated population on July 1st, 2004 was 12,406,292, which maintained Pennsylvania's ranking as the 6th largest state in the nation behind California, Texas, New York, Florida and Illinois. Table 3 shows Pennsylvania's rankings nationally in selected age groupings. An analysis of the population age 65 and over shows that Pennsylvania is no longer the second oldest state in the nation behind Florida in terms of the percent of the population age 65 and over. West Virginia, at 15.33 percent, barely beats out Pennsylvania at 15.29 percent as the second oldest state in the nation.

The Census Bureau develops state population estimates using administrative records in "a demographic-change model." The method follows each birth cohort according to its exposure to mortality, fertility and migration. It estimates population change from the most recent census using data on births, deaths and migration. The April 1, 2000 estimates base are derived from the Count Question Resolution Program and geographic program revisions.
