## Census Bureau Releases Population Estimates for Pennsylvania Cities, Boroughs and Townships-Philadelphia Remains Nation's 5<sup>th</sup> Largest City

MIDDLETOWN, Pa – Today, the U.S. Census Bureau released July 1, 2004 population estimates showing that Philadelphia remains the nation's 5<sup>th</sup> largest city. Philadelphia, with a population of 1.47 million, still ranks ahead of Phoenix, Arizona by approximately 52,000 persons in the list of the nation's ten largest cities. This difference has decreased significantly since Census 2000, when the gap was over 196,000 people.

The July 1, 2004 population estimates are based on Census 2000 and were updated using administrative records. The sub-county estimates for Pennsylvania include minor civil divisions (MCDs) that, for Pennsylvania, are its cities, townships and boroughs. Please note that due to changes based on the count resolution program -updates from the Boundary and Annexation Survey and geographic programs revisions, an April 1, 2000 estimates base was used in the estimating process.

#### The Nation's Fastest Growing Large Cities

An analysis of the nation's largest cities, those with a population greater than 100,000 persons, shows that Port St. Lucie, Florida is the nation's fastest growing large city with a 12.0 percent increase from July 1, 2003 to July 1 2004. Of the top 25 fastest growing large cities, 10 are from California. Arizona, Florida, Nevada and Texas all have 3 cities in the top 25. There are no cities in the top 25 from the northeast.

#### The Nation's Largest Growing Large Cities

Phoenix, Arizona had the largest numeric increase in population of those cities with a population greater than 100,000 persons. Phoenix experienced an increase of 29,826 persons from 2003 to 2004 and ranks 6<sup>th</sup> nationally with a population of 1.4 million. Nine California cities are in the top 25 of the nation's largest growing cities while 4 are from Texas. There are no northeastern cities in the top 25.

#### Pennsylvania's Municipalities

An analysis of Pennsylvania's municipalities shows that Palmyra Township, Wayne County is the state's fastest growing municipality. Palmyra Township increased 17.7



percent from 2003 to 2004. Pennsylvania had 7 municipalities with double-digit percent increases from 2003 to 2004. The 2004 estimated population of Palmyra Township was 1,409, an increase of 212 persons.

Lower Macungie Township, Lehigh County was the state's largest growing municipality. From 2003 to 2004, Lower Macungie Township increased by 1,500 persons to a total population of 24,454. Middletown Township, Bucks County (1,492) and Concord Township, Delaware County (1,067) were the only other municipalities in Pennsylvania to increase in population by more than 1,000 persons from 2003 to 2004 (see Table 1).

#### Pennsylvania's Larger Municipalities

Of the Pennsylvania municipalities with a population greater than 10,000 persons, Concord Township, Delaware County is Pennsylvania's fastest growing. Concord Township, Delaware County increased by 7.5 percent from 2003 to 2004. Lower Macungie Township, Lehigh County was second at 6.5 percent.

Lower Macungie Township has increased the most in population among the state's larger municipalities, with an increase of 1,500 persons from 2003 to 2004, as mentioned previously (see Table 2).

### Pennsylvania's Cities Continue to Decline

Only 2 of Pennsylvania's top 15 cities increased in population from 2003 to 2004. Allentown increased by 328 persons and Easton increased by 11. Allentown is the Commonwealth's third largest city with a July 1, 2004 estimated population of 106,732, and Easton is Pennsylvania's 15<sup>th</sup> largest city with a population of 26,267. In total, the state's 15 largest cities lost a combined population of 12,140 from 2003 to 2004 and 68,348 from April 1, 2000 (Census Day) until July 1, 2004 (see Table 3).
