Census Bureau Releases State & County Housing Unit Estimates for 2004 – New Housing in Pennsylvania Continues to Grow

MIDDLETOWN, Pa – Following national trends, the number of housing units in Pennsylvania increased for the fifth straight year. Between 2003 and 2004, Pennsylvania gained an additional 34,938 housing units, up from the 32,673 reported the year before. Since the 2000 Census (estimates base), Pennsylvania has gained an estimated 135,978 additional housing units, and is currently fifth among the states with an estimated 5,385,729 units. This data is based on the 2004 State and County Housing Unit Estimates released today by the U.S. Census Bureau. These estimates were compiled using the estimates base from April 1, 2000 (Census Day), and were carried forward to July 1, 2004.

Numeric Housing Unit Change

Though Pennsylvania continued to gain housing units between 2003 and 2004, it was ranked 20th in numeric growth among the states, and has no counties listed among the 25 fastest growing (numerically) counties in the nation. The ten counties gaining the most units were all situated in southeast and south-central Pennsylvania. Of these, York (+2,780), Bucks (+2,774), and Chester (+2,645) counties saw the largest increases. Twenty-two counties increased by 500 units or more. Philadelphia (-116) saw a decrease for the second straight year, followed by Cameron County, which lost one housing unit.

Percent Housing Unit Change

None of Pennsylvania's Counties was listed in the national county housing unit estimates of the 100 fastest growing counties between April 1, 2000 and July 1, 2004. Between 2003 and 2004 Pike (+2.3%), Monroe (+2.2%), and York (+1.7%) counties grew the fastest, while eight Pennsylvania counties experienced 0.1% growth or less. While the percent increase in housing units statewide was 2.6 percent from 2000 to 2004, there were 10 counties that experienced an increase of 5.0 percent or more. Monroe County had the largest increase, 9.5 percent. Pike was second (7.4%), followed by Chester (7.1%) and Adams (6.3%).

Methodology

The U.S. Census Bureau develops housing unit estimates by using building permits, mobile home shipments, and estimates of housing unit loss to measure housing unit change since the last census. Census estimates of housing units are updated each year and released to the public. These estimates are also used as controls for other census surveys.
