

Population Estimates Show Pennsylvania Continues Slow Growth; International Migration Most Significant Source of Change

MIDDLETOWN. Pa International migration is the biggest source of population growth Pennsylvania, in according to 2007 national and state population estimates and estimated components of change released recently by the U.S. Census Bureau. Pennsylvania's estimated population grew to 12,432,792 between July 1, 2006 and July 1, 2007, a growth rate of 0.2 percent. Pennsylvania ranked 24th in numeric change in population between 2006 and 2007 and 41st in percent change in population.



Pennsylvania remains the 6th largest state in the nation behind California, Texas, New York, Florida and Illinois. The data shows that the nation's population grew by 1.0 percent (2.8 million people) between 2006 and 2007. The United States estimated population as of July 1, 2007 is 301,621,157.

Pennsylvania's slower growth from 2006 to 2007 mirrors that of the region: the Northeast was last in both numeric increase (90,454) and percent increase (0.2 percent) of the four regions the Census Bureau classifies (U.S. regions also include the South, West and Midwest).

The U.S. and Pennsylvania Since Census 2000

Since April 1, 2000 (Estimates Base), Pennsylvania has increased in population by 151,738 persons, or 1.2 percent. Pennsylvania ranks 28th nationally in numeric increase in population and 46th nationally in percent increase in population since 2000.



Components of Population Change

Census Bureau population estimates are based on an update of Decennial Census base counts, incorporating components of population change, including births and deaths as well as domestic and international migration.


Natural Increase

Between 2006 and 2007, there were 146,776 births and 128,100 deaths in Pennsylvania, resulting in a net natural increase of 18,676 persons. During this period, the commonwealth was tied for the second-lowest annual rate of total natural increase (1.5 per 1,000), along with Maine. Pennsylvania also had the fifth-lowest birth rate (11.8 per 1,000) and the second-highest mortality rate (10.3 per 1,000). Since 2000, Pennsylvania's population grew by 114,795 through natural increases, with 1,050,424 births and 935,629 deaths.

The high mortality and low natural increase in Pennsylvania's population is consistent with trends seen in the region. The Northeast had the smallest natural increase of the four regions classified by the Census Bureau and the highest mortality. Since 2000, the Northeast region has added just 1,085,844 people, contrasting with the South, the fastest-growing region, which added 10,218,933 people during the same time.

Migration

In recent years, migration has fueled much of Pennsylvania's population growth, particularly international migration. That trend has continued in 2007; 9,542 people were added to Pennsylvania's population from migration. International migration resulted in an increase of 16,829 people. Internal (domestic) migration showed in more people moving out of Pennsylvania than in, with net internal migration totaling -7,377. Since 2000, 83,889 more people moved into Pennsylvania than out, with net international migration totaling 128,305 and internal migration totaling -44,416.
