Population Estimates Released for Pennsylvania Cities, Boroughs and Townships

MIDDLETOWN, Pa – The U.S. Census Bureau today released 2007 population estimates for sub-county geographies, including Pennsylvania cities, boroughs and townships.

Pennsylvania Municipalities

An analysis of Pennsylvania's municipalities shows that Slippery Rock Township (6,560), in Butler County, is the state's fastest growing municipality. The population of Slippery Rock increased 20.2 percent between 2006 and 2007. (Adamstown Borough in Berks County increased by 50.0 percent between 2006 and 2007, adding a single person, increasing in population from 2 to 3.) Three other Pennsylvania municipalities grew by double-digit percentages from 2006 to 2007: Valencia Borough in Butler County, Sewickley Hills Borough in Allegheny County, and Upper Uwchlan Township in Chester County. Since 2000, seventy-seven Pennsylvania municipalities experienced growth of 25 percent or higher during this period, while thirteen municipalities declined by more than ten percent.

Lower Macungie Township, in Lehigh County, gained the most residents between 2006 and 2007, increasing by 1,142 persons to a total population of 29,046. Slippery Rock Township (+1,103) and Upper Uwchlan Township (+968) followed Lower Macungie in population increase. Lower Macungie has also experienced the most numeric growth since 2000. (Table 1)

Population Growth and Decline in Large Cities

Philadelphia is the sixth-largest city in the nation, with a population of 1.45 million. Philadelphia continues to lose population, with 3,578 fewer people in the city in 2007 than in 2006 (a 0.2 percent loss). Pittsburgh (311,218) also continues to lose population, having 2,450 fewer people in 2007 than in 2006, representing a 0.8 percent decrease.

An analysis of the nation's large cities (those with a population greater than 100,000 persons) shows no northeastern cities ranked in the top 25 for percent growth between 2006 and 2007. Pennsylvania cities with a population of 100,000 or more were ranked accordingly: Allentown - 159th (+0.3 percent), Erie City - 203rd (-0.2 percent), Philadelphia - 210th (-0.2 percent), Pittsburgh City - 244th (-0.8 percent). There were a total of 262 cities above 100,000 in the nation.

New Orleans experienced the largest numeric increase in population of cities with 100,000 or more residents. Its population increased 28,926 persons from 2006 to 2007 (to 239,124). Again, no northeastern cities ranked in the top 25 for numeric growth.

Only two of Pennsylvania's 15 largest cities increased in population between 2006 and 2007. Allentown City grew by 315 persons, followed by Reading City (+49). The state's 15 largest cities combined for a net loss of 7,012 persons between 2006 and 2007. (Table 3)

Pennsylvania Municipalities with a Population of 10,000 or More

Upper Uwchlan Township (+10.2 percent) was the fastest growing Pennsylvania municipality with a population of 10,000 or more from 2006 to 2007. Bethel Township, Delaware County, (+8.8 percent) and Lower Moreland Township, Montgomery County, (+5.3 percent) followed Upper Uwchlan.

Lower Macungie Township increased the most in population (+1,142) among the state's larger municipalities from 2006 to 2007, followed by Upper Uwchlan (+968) and Bethel (+875) Townships. (Table 2)

The July 1, 2007 sub-county estimates for Pennsylvania include minor civil divisions (MCDs) that include the state's cities, townships and boroughs. Please note that due to changes based on the count resolution program, updates from the Boundary and Annexation Survey and geographic programs revisions, an April 1, 2000 estimates base was used in the estimating process.
