

Growth of Pennsylvania Housing Units in 2007

PENN STATE HARRISBURG – Pennsylvania has some of the nation's oldest housing stock, but new estimates released today by the Census Bureau show that the state continues to add new houses, apartments and mobile homes. According to the new estimates, the total number of Pennsylvania's housing units grew to 5,477,864 in 2007, ranking the Commonwealth 5th among all states in number of housing units. Between July 1, 2006 and July 1, 2007, Pennsylvania gained 24,901 housing units, a 0.5 percent increase. Since 2000, the number of housing units has increased by 228,113, a 4.3 percent increase. The Commonwealth ranks 45th among the states in percent increase between 2000 and 2007 (4.3 percent). In terms of percent, Pennsylvania housing has grown about half as fast as the nation over the last six years (see chart).



Pennsylvania Counties

None of Pennsylvania's counties ranked among the top 100 nationally in percent growth of housing units between 2006-2007 and 2000-2007. York County (+2,472) led all Pennsylvania counties in the number of housing units gained in 2007, followed by Chester (+2,147) and Montgomery (+1,948) Counties. Fayette, Armstrong, Forest, McKean, Cameron, Lawrence and Bradford Counties showed a slight decline in housing units between 2006 and 2007, but all had increased overall since 2000. Among those



counties that lost housing units in 2007, virtually all showed consistent growth between 2000 and 2005, and only began to show declines in the last three years. Pike (+2.3), Monroe (+1.7), Carbon (+1.6) and Butler (+1.5) led Pennsylvania counties in percent growth from 2006-2007.

Chester (+19,862) led Pennsylvania counties in the number of housing units gained since 2000, followed by York (+17,342) and Montgomery (+16,242) Counties. Monroe (+16.1 percent) and Pike (+15.6 percent) Counties had the highest percent increases since 2000 (see Table 1).

The counties that saw the largest increase in housing units were largely concentrated in the eastern portion of the state, while most of the counties that saw housing unit decline were in the western portion of the state. The exception to this trend was Butler County, located in the western portion of the state, which had among the largest percent increase in housing last year. Philadelphia (-1,297 units, or -0.2 percent) was the only county to lose housing units since 2000.

More about Housing Unit Estimates

According the Census Bureau, a housing unit is defined as any structure meant to be used as separate living quarters, including houses, apartments, mobile homes and trailers, or groups of rooms. Both occupied and unoccupied housing units are including in housing unit counts, except that vacant mobile homes or trailers are only included if they are intended for occupancy on the site where they are located.

Housing unit estimates use building permits, mobile home shipments, and estimates of housing unit loss to update housing unit change since the last census. Census counts of housing units are geographically updated each year to reflect legal changes reported in the Boundary and Annexation Survey (BAS), Census corrections, and other administrative revisions. The reference date for estimates is July 1.
