## Population Estimates Released for Pennsylvania Cities, Boroughs and Townships

PENN STATE HARRISBURG – The U.S. Census Bureau today released July 1, 2008 population estimates for sub-county geographies, including Pennsylvania cities, boroughs and townships.

# Pennsylvania Municipalities

Penn Township (5,699), in Chester County, is the state's fastest growing municipality. The population of Penn Township increased 102.7 percent between 2000 and 2008. (Jenks Township and Waymart Borough both increased by larger margins, but those population increases were due to construction of new prison facilities.) Two other Pennsylvania municipalities grew by more than 75 percent since 2000: Hallam Borough in York County (87.1 percent) and Bethel Township in Delaware County (75.3 percent). See Table 1.

Since 2000, ninety-four Pennsylvania municipalities experienced growth of 25 percent or higher, while twenty-nine declined by ten percent or more.

## **Population Growth and Decline in Large Cities**

Philadelphia is the sixth-largest city in the nation, with a population of 1.45 million. Philadelphia continues to lose population, with 70,155 fewer people in the city in 2007 than in 2000 (a 4.6 percent loss). Pittsburgh (310,037) also continues to lose population, having 24,526 fewer people in 2007 than in 2000, representing a 7.3 percent decrease.

Only five of Pennsylvania's 15 largest cities increased in population between 2007 and 2008: combined, the state's 15 largest municipalities declined by 3,334 persons between 2007 and 2008. An analysis of the nation's large cities (those with a population greater than 100,000 persons) shows no northeastern cities ranked in the top 25 for percent growth between 2006 and 2007.

Population growth in Pennsylvania municipalities was concentrated in the eastern and south-central region, especially in the counties surrounding Philadelphia and bordering Maryland and New Jersey. Population decline was most prevalent in municipalities in the Western and North-central regions of the state.

The July 1, 2008 sub-county estimates for Pennsylvania include the state's cities, townships and boroughs. Please note that due to changes based on the count resolution program, updates from the Boundary and Annexation Survey and geographic programs revisions, an April 1, 2000 estimates base was used in the estimating process.
