
2018 County Total Population Estimates Released

HARRISBURG – The U.S. Census Bureau today released estimates of the total population as of July 1, 2018 at the county level. Population estimates are calculated using administrative records to estimate components of population change such as births, deaths, and migration. Total population for sub-county areas (municipalities) will be released in May. Nation, state, and county-level totals by age, sex, race and ethnicity will be available in June.

Key trends in county population change:

- Cumberland County remained fastest growing county in PA
- Lebanon County surpassed Centre and Lehigh, now the second-fastest growing county
- Southeastern and South Central PA continue to grow as the north and west decline

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Population Growth in Pennsylvania

Philadelphia County, the Commonwealth's most populous county, reported the largest growth numerically at 58,129 persons since 2010, although Montgomery (+4,042) outpaced Philadelphia's growth (+3,917) from 2017 to 2018. Montgomery (+28,732), Lancaster (+24,111), Chester (+22,913), and Lehigh (+18,424) followed the Birthplace of America as the highest grossing counties numerically since 2010.

Top Five Fastest Growing Counties in PA, 2010 to 2018

Cumberland County remained the fastest growing county since 2010 (+0.9%), although Lebanon County had the highest percent gain from 2017 to 2018 (+1.3%). Lebanon, Centre, Lehigh, and Lancaster rounded out the top 5 counties by percent change since 2010 while also boasting modest increases since the previous year. Lebanon County, which ranked fourth by percentage change in the 2017 estimates, outpaced Centre and Lehigh by overall rate of growth since 2010 to become the second-fastest growing according to this year's estimates.



Pennsylvania experienced population decreases in 47 counties since 2010, and 38 counties decreased in population between 2017 and 2018. Westmoreland (-14,583), Cambria (-11,951), Erie (-8,523), Schuylkill (-6,224), and Fayette (-6,154) had the highest decreases since 2010 while Allegheny County, the state's second-most populous county, experienced the highest numeric decrease from 2017 to 2018 (-2,204).

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Top Five Fastest Declining Counties in PA, 2010 to 2018

Cameron County retained the largest decadal losses in percent change and the largest percent lost from 2017 to 2018 (-2.8%). In addition to Cameron, Cambria, Venango, Susquehanna, and McKean Counties constituted the five highest counties in percent loss since 2010.

Births, Deaths, and Migration in the Commonwealth

There were an estimated 1,160,725 births in Pennsylvania since 2010 with 135,905 of those occurring in 2018. A total of 1,071,084 deaths occurred since 2010 resulting in a natural increase of 89,641 persons. In 2018, 133,562 deaths resulted in a natural increase of 2,343 for the state. International migration continued to make up for the state's outmigration of natural-born residents with a net migration of 22,862 for the eight-year period.

From 2010 to 2018, Philadelphia (+65,932), Lancaster (+17,749), and Chester (+13,779) had the highest natural increases in the state while Westmoreland (-11,212), Luzerne (-6,868), and Schuylkill (-4,936) had the most natural losses. The largest net migration occurred in Montgomery (+17,253), Cumberland (+13,679), and Lehigh (+12,032) with largest losses in Erie (-11,067), Cambria (-7,980), and Philadelphia (-6,770).

From 2017 to 2018, Philadelphia (+5,406), Lancaster (+1,729), and Chester (+1,120) had the highest natural increases while Westmoreland (-1,624), Allegheny (-1,045), and Luzerne (-848) experienced the most natural loss. Net migration was highest in Montgomery (+3,359), Chester (+2,032), and Northampton (+2,007) and negative net migration was seen in Erie (-1,935), Philadelphia (-1,402), and Allegheny (-1,099) from 2017 to 2018.
